

FEDERATION OF LAW SOCIETIES OF CANADA

Canada's 14 provincial and territorial Law Societies govern 120,000 lawyers, 3,8000 Quebec notaries and 9,000 Ontario paralegals in the public interest. The Federation of Law Societies of Canada is their national coordinating body. The Federation leads in the development of high national standards of regulation to ensure that all Canadians are served by a competent, honourable and independent legal profession. The Law Society of Saskatchewan has an opening for a Council member to serve for a two-year term and who may also be eligible for reappointment for up to six years, effective January 1, 2019.

The ideal candidate will have sufficient recent and relevant professional regulation experience to provide national leadership, as well as the time and a sincere commitment to remain current on issues of the Law Society of Saskatchewan. The expectations for the Council member are as follows:

1. Attend all FLSC Council meetings (currently 4 in-person meetings).
2. Report after each meeting to the Law Society of Saskatchewan (LSS) Benchers, and where appropriate, before that time, to the Executive Committee or the President, Vice-President and the Executive Director.
3. Provide supporting documentation received from the FLSC to the LSS as appropriate, to ensure that the LSS is fully informed about national initiatives and the FLSC agenda.
4. Attend LSS Bencher meetings to facilitate this obligation and answer questions.
5. Obtain instructions from Saskatchewan, where necessary, regarding matters on the FLSC agenda, which instructions may come from the President in consultation with the Vice-President and the Executive Director, or the Executive Committee or the Benchers. Bencher approval will generally be obtained for matters touching on regulatory issues such as rule or policy changes and financial commitments.
6. Remain fully informed about the work of the LSS, and in particular, the Benchers' priorities and agenda.
7. Where appropriate, use such information to inform the work of the Council and manage Council's expectations regarding Saskatchewan's ability to deal with FLSC agenda items.
8. As appropriate, convey Saskatchewan's desire for the FLSC to achieve certain objectives.
9. Facilitate an exchange of information between Saskatchewan and other Law Societies on matters of common interest.
10. Participate fully as a committee member on whatever committee(s) the Council representative is invited to participate on a national level.
