

## Recognized Schools Application for Admission as a Limited Licensee (Rule 1006)

Rule 1006(1) of the [Law Society of Saskatchewan Rules](#) identifies that a limited licensee must have Canadian education or work experience which can include:

- (a) a degree in justice-related studies from a recognized school
- (b) a certificate or targeted courses from a recognized school in the subject area related to the scope of practice.

Rule 1001 defines “recognized school” for the purpose of subrules 1006(1)(a) and 1006(1)(b) as “an educational institution offering a degree, certificate or targeted courses in justice-related studies or subject areas related to a limited licensee’s scope of practice as may be determined by the Executive Director”.

Schools that have been recognized by the Law Society of Saskatchewan include:

- common law faculties of law at a Canadian university [approved](#) by the Federation of Law Societies of Canada
- the National Committee on Accreditation of the Federation of Law Societies of Canada (Certificate of Qualification)
- accredited paralegal education programs as [recognized](#) by the Law Society of Ontario

This list is provided as guidance for potential applicants for a limited license. The Law Society evaluates education only within the context of an individual application for licensure.
